7.4.6.2 All shooting jackets, shooting trousers and shooting gloves must be made of flexible material that does not materially change its physical characteristics, that is, become stiffer, thicker or harder, under commonly accepted shooting conditions. All lining, ~~and padding and reinforcements~~ must meet the same specifications. Any lining ~~or padding~~ must not be quilted, cross-stitched, glued or otherwise affixed to the outer clothing layer other than at normal tailoring points. All lining ~~or padding~~ must be measured as a part of the clothing.

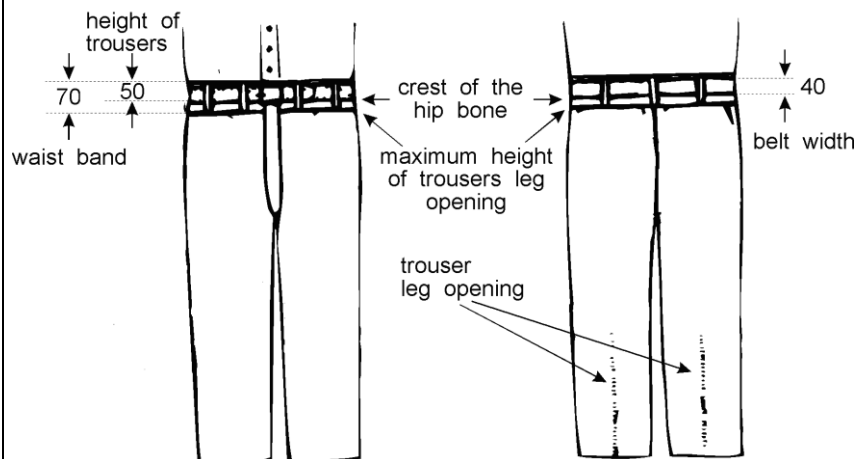
7.4.7.8 Shooting Trousers (change) - Clarification

7.4.7.8.1 The trousers, including the lining, must not exceed 2.5 mm in single thickness and 5 mm in double thickness at any point where flat surfaces may be measured. The top of the trousers must not fit or be worn higher on the body than 50 mm above the crest of the hipbone. All drawstrings, zippers or fasteners to tighten the trousers around the legs or hips are prohibited. To support the trousers only a normal waist belt not more than 40 mm wide and 3mm thick or braces (suspenders) may be worn. If a belt is worn in the standing position, the buckle or fastening must not be used to support the left arm or elbow. The belt must not be doubled, tripled etc. under the left arm or elbow. If the trousers have a waist band, it may not be more than 70 mm wide. If the thickness of the waistband exceeds 2.5 mm, a waist belt is not permitted. If a waist belt is not worn, the absolute maximum thickness of the waistband is 3.5 mm. Each belt loop (keeper) must not exceed 20 mm width. The trousers may be closed by one hook and up to five (5) eyes, or up to five (5) adjustable snap fasteners, or similar closure or Velcro (Hook & Loop but there may must only be one layer of Hook and one layer of Loop, when closed, the closure must not be multi layered). Only one type of closure is permitted. A Velcro (Hook and Loop) closure combined with any other closure is prohibited. The trousers must be loose around the legs. If special shooting trousers are not worn, ordinary trousers may be worn providing they do not give artificial support to any part of the body.

7.4.7.8.2.3 No reinforcements may be added to the seat and both or knees of the trousers. ~~The seat patch must not exceed the width of the hips and the vertical measurement must not be longer than to cover the normal wear points on the seat of the wearer. Knee patches may have a maximum length of 300 mm. Knee reinforcements must not be wider than half the circumference of the trousers leg. The thickness of reinforcement including the trousers material and any linings must not exceed 10 mm in single thickness (20 mm double thickness).~~ All pockets are prohibited.

7.5.1.2.1 The shooter must stand free with both feet on the firing point surface or on the ~~ground cloth~~ shooting mat without any other support.

Kinesio Tape and sports taping

During the Milan 2009 WC there was a discussion among the jury members about Kinesio Tape or sports taping. I talked to the physiotherapist of the USA team and she was very kind to explain me what is Kinesio Tape and how it works. She also explained the traditional sports taping which is used to contract muscle movement. According to the lady Kinesio taping can be used either to enhance or to contract muscle movement. It doesn't immobilize the body part on which it is applied but we have to consider if it can be accepted during a shooting event.

What does Kinesio Taping do.

Kinesio Taping gives support and stability to your joints and muscles without affecting circulation and range of motion. It is also used for Preventive Maintenance, Edema, and Pain Management.

Kinesio Taping is a technique based on the body's own natural healing process. This Kinesio Taping exhibits its efficacy through the activation of neurological and circulatory systems. This method basically stems from the science of Kinesiology, hence the name "Kinesio". Muscles are not only attributed to the movements of the body but also control the circulation of venous and lymph flows, body temperature, etc. Therefore, the failure of the muscles to function properly induces various kinds of symptoms.

Consequently, so much attention was given to the importance of muscle function that the idea of treating the muscles in order to activate the body's own healing process came about. Using an elastic tape, it was discovered that muscles and other tissues could be helped by outside assistance. Employment of Kinesio Taping creates a totally new approach to treating nerves, muscles, and organs. The first application of Kinesio Taping was for a patient with articular disorders.

For the first 10 years, orthopaedists, chiropractors, acupuncturists and other medical practitioners were the main users of Kinesio Taping. Soon thereafter, Kinesio Taping was used by the Japanese Olympic volleyball players and word quickly spread to other athletes. Today, Kinesio Taping is accepted by medical practitioners and athletes in Japan, United States, Europe, South America and other Asian countries.

The Kinesio Taping Method is applied over muscles to reduce pain and inflammation, relax overused tired muscles, and to support muscles in movement on a 24hr/day basis. It is non-restrictive type of taping which allows for full range of motion.

In contrast, traditional sports' taping is wrapped around a joint strictly for stabilization and support during a sporting event obstructing the flow of bodily fluids... an UNDESIRABLE side-effect.

Kinesio Tape is used for anything from headaches to foot problems and everything in between. Examples include: muscular facilitation or inhibition in paediatric patients, carpal tunnel syndrome, lower back strain/pain (subluxations, herniated disc), knee conditions, shoulder conditions, hamstring, groin injury, rotator cuff injury, whiplash, tennis elbow, plantar fasciitis, patella tracking, pre and post surgical edema, ankle sprains, athletic preventative injury method, and as a support method.

The consensus of the meeting was that it was against the "Spirit" of the ISSF Official Statutes, Rules and Regulations and, hence should not be permitted.

The need for an internet based 'forum' and repository for the rifle committee members

There was a discussion this year among the Rifle Committee Members regarding certain Sauer shooting trousers. A lot of emails were exchanged and everybody was writing his/her opinion and/or commenting on the subject. The result was a whole pile of emails that nobody could arrange in a specific order and keep track of the situation.

At some time this year I needed the form we use for writing down the measurements during jacket and trousers control. I could not find it in my files so I looked at the ISSF site. It was impossible to find it either so I asked it from Willy.

My proposal is to have a small internet based 'forum' where only the rifle committee members will have access (for example by user name and password) and all subjects for discussion will be saved there in chronological order. A small internet database and some internet forms can achieve this. In this way everybody can see what the other members think about the subject and can write his/her opinion.

This 'forum' must also host all necessary forms and files. In this way we can find something we need when for example we are in a shooting event.

Technical Rules for all Shooting Disciplines:

6.4.2.1.1 The use of any special devices means or garments which immobilize or unduly reduce the movement of the shooter's legs, body or arms is prohibited in order to ensure that the performance Skills of the shooters are not artificially improved by special clothing.

No change s/S ??

Rifle Rules:

“7.4.7.3 All straps, laces, bindings, seams, stitching or devices which may be construed as artificial support are prohibited.....”

“7.4.7.10.2 Only normal personal undergarments and/or training clothing that does not immobilize or unduly reduce the movement of the shooter's legs, body or arms may be worn under the shooting Jacket and/or trousers. Any other undergarments are prohibited.”

No change seen

Proposed rules changes: These proposed changes will reduce the amount of thickness and stiffness of the shooting clothing, therefore reducing the amount of artificial support provided by the clothing.

7.4.6.2 All shooting jackets, shooting trousers and shooting gloves must be made of flexible material that does not materially change its physical characteristics, that is, become stiffer, thicker or harder, under commonly accepted shooting conditions. All lining, padding and reinforcements must meet the same specifications. Any lining or padding must not be quilted, cross-stitched, glued or otherwise affixed to the outer clothing layer other than at normal tailoring points. All lining or padding must be measured as a part of the clothing. **All clothing must be fabricated using canvas and leather as the basic materials. No plastic panels or plastic inserts are permitted.**

7.4.6.3 Shooting Shoes

Normal street type or light athletic shoes, and shooting shoes not exceeding the following specifications are permitted:

7.4.6.3.1 The material of the upper part (above the line of the sole) must be of soft, flexible, pliable material, not thicker than 4 mm, including all linings, when measured on any flat surfaces such as point D in the Figure of the Shoe. **No removable inserts are permitted.**

7.4.6.3.2 The sole must be flexible at the ball of the foot. **This must be demonstrated by manually flexing the shoe or walking in a normal heel-toe manner, at equipment inspection or when requested by a Jury member.**

7.4.7 Shooting Jacket

7.4.7.1 The body and sleeves of the jacket, including the lining, must not exceed 2.5 mm **2.0 mm** in single thickness and 5 mm **4.0 mm** in double thickness at any point where flat surfaces may be measured. The jacket must not be longer than the bottom of the balled fist (see Jacket Table).

7.4.7.2 Closure of the jacket must be only by non-adjustable means e.g. buttons or zippers. The jacket must not overlap more than 100 mm at the closure (see Jacket Table). The jacket must hang loosely on the wearer. To determine this, the jacket must be capable of being overlapped beyond the normal closure by at least 70 mm, measured from the centre of the button to the outside edge of the button hole. The measurement will be taken with the arms at the sides. A measurement may be made either manually or with an ISSF approved overlap gauge with a tension of 6 kg to 8 kg. The area surrounding the button hole is limited to a maximum of 12 mm, and this area may exceed the permitted 2.5 mm **2.0 mm** thickness.

7.4.7.4 The construction of the back panel may include more than one-piece of material provided that this construction does not stiffen or reduce the flexibility of the jacket. All parts of the back panel must comply with the thickness limit of 2.5 mm **2.0 mm** when measured over a flat surface. All parts must comply with the stiffness limit.

7.4.7.7.1 Maximum thickness, including jacket material and all linings: 10 mm **8 mm** single thickness or 20 mm **16 mm** when measured as a double thickness.

7.4.7.10 Dressing the Shooter

7.4.7.10.1 Clothing worn under the shooting jacket must not be thicker than 2.5 mm **2.0 mm** single thickness or 5 mm **4 mm** double thickness. The same applies to all clothing worn under the trousers.

b. Equipment

- Technical Committee presented a picture of an air rifle that had the dimension "D" rule 7.4.2.6 & 7.4.2.7 Table, increased to the maximum permitted (90mm) dimension, by the addition of an attachable block, that does not appear to be orthopaedially formed. The Committee voted on the matter and a majority decided that it would be permitted. The range Jury has the duty to ensure that this type of addition to the depth of the Forend is not used as a hand-stop.

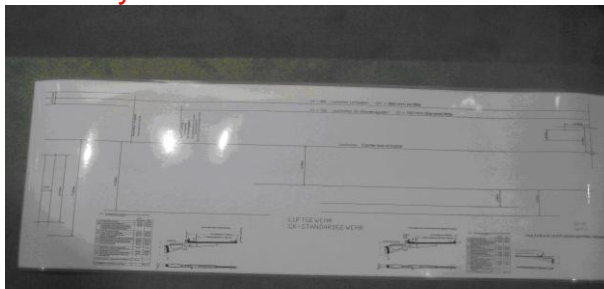

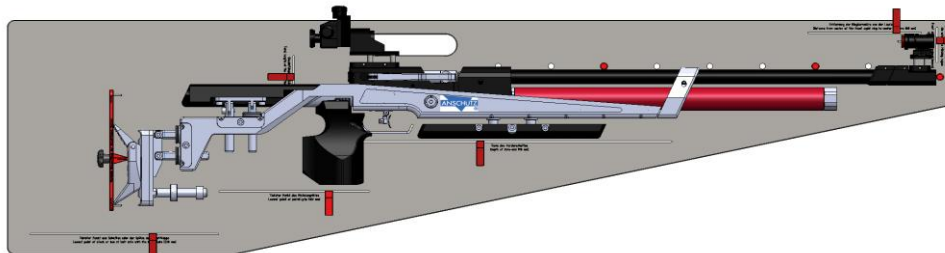

8. Some problems at the international competitions in 2009

a) R E P O R T FROM THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS – EPSO 2009 Osijek, 12 – 26 July 2009

The organiser had to face a whole range of difficulties in preparation and arrangement of the shooting range for the European Championships.

The local government in the city of Osijek changed four times in two years, always coming up with new political options and constant postponing of provision of funds for the reconstruction and refurbishment of the facilities at the Pampas shooting range. Global recession had a considerable impact on the course of preparations.

Finally, the funds were provided the shooting range was completely reconstructed and five ranges for shotgun events, equipped with Mattarelli devices, were made.

A notable contribution to the finishing of all works on the facilities was given by the Croatian Army, whose manpower and technical equipment was

used at the Pampas shooting range for more than seven months.

Thanks to a large number of involved professionals and judges (more than 380 in total), the Championships was organised and conducted in a professional and efficient way.

Special thanks go to the Technical Delegate Mr Max Mückl, jury members and over 70 judges with the international judges' licence for the excellent conduct of the Championships.

The conditions at the shooting range, both technical and atmospheric, enabled excellent conduct of the event, at which:

- 4 new world records were established and 3 world records were equalled;
- 4 new European records were established and 3 European records were equalled.

The Championships was held in 37 (disciplines) events, with the participation of 995 shooters and 1,412 starts.

The competitors came from 44 national shooting federations from 43 European countries.

Medals were won by representatives of 27 countries:

Before the Championships in Osijek, the Election General Assembly of the ESC was held. The new Presidium of the ESC was elected for a term of office of next four years, with Mr Vladimir Lisin of Russia at the position of the President.

Accommodation and transfers were well organised, especially the transfers Zagreb – Osijek, which was flawless. In 23 days, a large number of buses, vans and personal cars made a total of 125,647 kilometres in transfers of the Assembly delegates, competitors, coaches and members of the jury.

However, we should say that there were some remarks and complaints about the shooting range premises, changing of shooters' clothes on the shooting line and keeping the entire equipment in the shooting space, so that the new President Mr Vladimir Lisin concluded that new and better solutions should be found, especially in the women's part of the event.

Finally, the Championships was closed with a dispute with the organiser, which refused to pay to the ISSF the newly established fee of EUR 5.00 for each start at the Championships, due to the earlier signed agreement.

With regard to the new ISSF Rules adopted at the ISSF Assembly in Beijing in April 2008, the Republic Shooting Council of the Croatian Shooting

Federation decided that the Croatian Shooting Federation would take over that liability and make a corresponding payment.

- Greater emphasis be placed on the appointment of the Host Nation Jury & CRO that have English language skills (or have sport specific interpreters available) to carry out their tasks efficiently

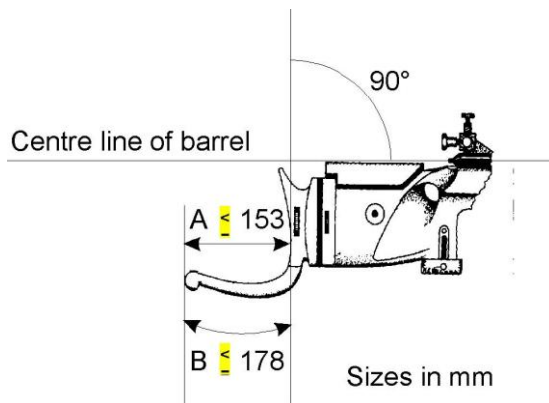

We always give points for the best shot, example: 10, 1 or 10, 4, the shooters with 10, 4 get the point

If a shooter has already 2 points out of 3 we will stop this pair, and this shooter can go forward to the next round, because the other can not win anymore.

If one shooter from the pair does not appear for the competition, then automatically the other shooter is considered to be the winner and will go on for the next round.

In case of any tie, a shoot off will decide it, all pairs will fire at the same time until the tie is broken.

The time limit per shot is 45 seconds, in shoot off too.

The system is in Knock Out (KO), so at the end of each round 4 shooters will go forward to the next round.

After all shooters have fired the first round, the winners for the next round will go on without preparation time and sighting shots.

After each round, a new drawing by lot will be done, so that the new pairs are built, and this will go on until the last 2 pairs.

After each round the previous points will be deleted, and the shooters start from zero (0) points. Shooting Time 30 seconds

4. Events for Juniors and Veterans: (pm 17d):

The possibility of having prestigious events for both Juniors and Veterans was discussed. Particularly in the first 2 years after the year of an Olympic Games.

After considerable discussion it was agreed that this should be tried.

It was noted that the term "World Cup" for these events would not be possible.

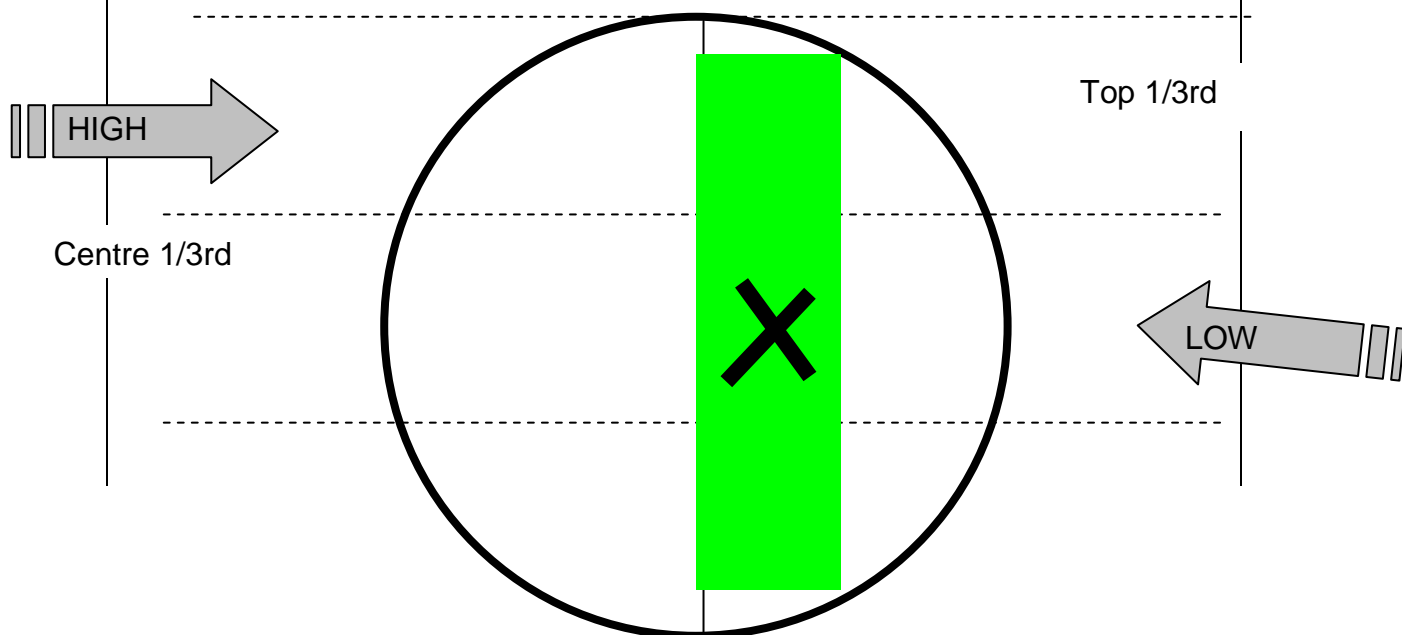

Set High house to cross the Low house target at the centre* of the ring and above the Low house target

* *Tolerance minus 15cms*





HOW TO PLACE THE ISSF OFFICIAL SKEET MARKER TAPE ON YOUR SHOOTING VEST



Sai Chiang

1. To aid the Referee in controlling the position of the shotgun the ISSF Official Marker Tape must be permanently affixed to the appropriate side of the shooting vest. The competition Jury will implement a program during the hours of pre-event training to check the position of all competitors' Official Marker Tapes. The correct position of the Tape is important to passing this inspection and allowing the shooter to have a quick and smooth gun mount.



2. Prepare a thin flat board made of cardboard or other similar material. The board should be at least 30 cm (12 inches) square. Rub a piece of white or colored chalk along one of the edges. The buildup of chalk on this edge will allow you to leave an erasable mark on the shooting vest showing the correct position of the Tape.

Report from ISSF Council Meeting by Pekka Kuusisto

32 members were present in the meeting.

New ISSF Member Federations are Myanmar and Nigeria.

The ISSF accepted the equipment from Sius-Ascor for all 10, 25, 50 and 300 m events, equipment from Megalink and Polytronic for 10 and 50m, Meyton for 50m events. **Noted Meyton is not approved!**

Disag and Spieth equipment is still not approved for ISSF competitions.

There will be no changes for present rules before OG London 2012.

Preparations for WCH 2010 in Munich are on schedule.

Report from ISSF Running Target WCH 2009

Both the Executive Committee and Administrative Council of the ISSF granted provisional WCH for Running Target in their meetings in April 2009.

The Finnish Sport Shooting Federation took the challenge and promised to arrange competitions in Heinola / FIN in the end of August.

69 shooters from 13 countries participated with a total of 192 starts. With the exception of the women category there had been enough shooters to arrange individual and team competitions.

Transportation was well organised from Helsinki by busses and minibusses. All delegations arrived during two days which made transportation quite easy. The delegations also stayed together in the shooting range area so no further transportation was needed.

The Vierumäki shooting range had three ranges for 10m and one range for 50m. All of them were electronic targets and very experienced staff made the competitions comfortable. The staff of competitions was 15 persons on the ranges and 7 in competitions office.

A new world record was set by the Russian junior team in 10m with 1702 points (old WR 1698 p.). Maxim Stepanov, RUS, equalled the long lasting WR in the 50m event with 596 points.

No protests were made and all shooters and team officials were satisfied for arrangements.

The MedalMatches in men and women 10m events attracted a full hall of spectators as well as press people from Finnish newspapers and reporters from ISSF NEWS.

Hopefully this procedure of separate WCH for Running Target can continue and attract more nations to participate once again.

Experiences with MedalMatch and proposals for rules change

Proposals for modification of Running Target rules :

- 1 50 m target from running boar to "dots"

The Committee decided not to change the 50m target, because there is no increase in number of shooters expected. In most countries the 50m boar target has strong support from hunting and a change of target could be a risk to loose shooters.

2 free scope magnification and free length of scope

The Committee discussed the proposal and decided to gather more information from nations and shooters. The Committee is positive about cancelling the restriction in scope length but not in magnification.

A decision will be made in the next meeting in 2010.

Agreed concerning no restriction in the length. Therefore the restriction is cancelled with immediate effect.

3 No point from equal result in Medal Match

The Committee agreed to the proposal and makes a suggestion to the Technical Committee for a rule change.

Noted - goes into the errata

4 Two points difference between Winner and Looser in Medal Match

Regarding a quick and short decision the Committee denies the proposal. The Medal Match might then take too long. In other shooting events we have also only one shot e.g. for breaking ties.

Dear Pekka!

The Technical Committee questions the point 4 of your experiences with the Medal Match.

That "the Medal Match might then take too long" if there is a two (2) point difference between winner and loser in the Medal Match.

The Committee would be interested in an explanation as to why your committee has made this decision as it is believed that the media and others have a different opinion.

Has it been taken into account the RT procedure with left and right runs?

The Committee supports the online match from the Austrian Shooting Federation in Running Target 10m "Int. RT Austria Cup 2010". Website : www.marc.lha.at from Jan. 1st 2010.

Given below are some of the earlier action points where we have not received

the feedback on action taken:

- The Committee discussed the issue of formation of the Athletes Committee of various affiliated continental and national federations with the Secretary General. It was agreed that a suitable circular would be sent to all the affiliated member federations and respective continental federations to form the Athletes Committee. In case some of the federations do not react then another letter will be given at the Munich world cup in 2009 Championship 2010.

- At present the shooter on station no: 1 has to wait for the shooter at station no: 5 to walk up before the referee gives that command to him to shoot. This will help the commentators to give more meaningful comments and the spectator to enjoy the game more rather than getting into mathematical calculations on the scores.

- Any kind of major changes in the shooting rules should be implemented almost immediately after the Olympic Games. Changes taking place after a considerable delay are detrimental to the athlete's preparation for the Olympic Games and we do not agree to make such changes.

- In the constitution of the athletes committee when the nominations are received from the National federations, it is imperative the ISSF asks to nominate only those athletes who can communicate in English to have better and fruitful discussions during the meetings.

Trying all the three variations will help in getting a comparative feedback. Our committee also proposed that a suitable marketing company be hired to look into the possibility of replacing double trap with an event, which is spectator friendly and would generate a lot of revenue for the sport. The

information of any change should be immediately conveyed to the shooters so that they can plan their careers accordingly.
